



### **Appendix 3 - Guide to the Lessons that Relate to Sex Education within the RSHE Curriculum for Parents & Carers**

RSHE is statutory for all children and it is important that all children take part in the lessons. The table below shows topics that build up the knowledge children will need to access the Sex Education lessons in Year 6.

The Government have made RSHE content statutory and therefore parents cannot withdraw their child from these lessons. The only aspect parents have the right to withdraw their children from is sex education.

Within the Kapow Primary lessons, these would be:

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In terms of RSHE, it is important that teaching meets the needs of all children in school and fosters good relationships between groups. The theme of equality is included throughout our content.

One area which has caused concern for some schools is the teaching about same sex relationships. This is covered as one of the protected characteristics of the Equality Act and should be included. At Primary level it is statutory to teach about different types of families and this would include those with same sex parents. In line with good practice these themes are included within our lessons and are not standalone units. For example, in the lesson about families, same sex parents are included alongside other types of family and in the lesson on marriage same sex marriage is covered.

Same sex relationships are also addressed within our puberty lessons, as children learn about the emotional changes they will go through.

### The Equality Act

In Year 6, includes information on how they may begin to feel attracted to other people of the same sex, or both the same sex and the opposite sex.
